A Brief Early History of North Shore Congregation Israel

IN 1920, a small group of families living on the North Shore, but still members of the classical reform Sinai Congregation in Chicago, sought to create a northern branch of the congregation closer to their homes. And so it was that, with a vote of 40 people, the original founders established "The North Shore Branch of Sinai Congregation" for those with "an interest in furthering their thought and creating a background of Jewish thought for their children." June 1, 1920 marked the first Shabbat service. It was held at the Hubbard Woods School in Winnetka, Illinois, after which point services were held at irregular intervals based on the rabbi's availability.

Within a few years, more than 250 families were a part of the congregation, catalyzing the desire for a more permanent and independent identity. As such, the members voted to separate from Sinai Congregation on April 19, 1926, and the name North Shore Congregation Israel was chosen three months later.

In 1928, the congregation purchased land in Glencoe and dedicated a new facility located at the corner of Lincoln and Vernon. It was just before the stock market crash that heralded the Great Depression. Although this ensuing era marked great instability and change, NSCI's membership remained largely cohesive, grounded in the value that no one would be turned away for financial reasons.

After World War II. Jewish families started moving to the suburbs in increasingly large numbers. Moreover, there was no congregation, Reform, Conservative, or Traditional, north of the Chicago city limits, except North Shore Congregation Israel. At this time, the Board of NSCI voted to hire its first permanent senior rabbi, Rabbi Edgar Siskin. Having outgrown the footprint of the Vernon Avenue space, a 1952 fundraising campaign enabled the construction of a new classroom wing, a social hall, and new offices. That soon became too small, as NSCI attained a membership of over 1,850 families, with nearly 2,000 children in our religious school. An opportunity arose to purchase a beautiful plot of land on Sheridan Road.
